
- 'While the focus of social life is narrowing down to the present, the futures we create on a daily basis cast ever longer shadows' (Adam & Groves, 2007)
- Parallel narratives 'business-as usual' and 'apocalyptic' anti-future teleological narratives (Randall, 2007)
- Fatalism, inescapable futures narrative foreclosure
- Hope?





- Reconciliation: with what and whom shall we make peace as we awaken to our mutual mortality? (*The Earth, all 'others'...*)




